

What is Accident Scene First Aid?

Worksheet

Accident scene first aid is rapid, safe intervention at a crash: check scene safety, call 112, place injured in recovery position, and perform CPR when necessary.

1. At an accident scene, what's your absolute first action?

Answer Key

1. B) Check for hazards and scene safety — Scene safety comes first—you cannot help anyone if you become injured.
2. B) 112 — 112 is Turkey's universal emergency number for all emergencies.
3. B) unconscious breathing people — It keeps airway open and prevents choking if the person vomits.
4. B) 30 compressions, 2 breaths — Standard CPR: 30 chest compressions at 100-120/min followed by 2 rescue breaths.
5. 1. Scan the scene for hazards—moving traffic, fuel spill, fire risk 2. Only if safe, approach and check for injured 3. Call 112 immediately with location (intersection name) and injuries observed 4. Provide clear details: number of vehicles, estimated number of injured
6. 1. Ensure the person's airway is open—place on their side (recovery position) 2. Tilt head back slightly to prevent choking 3. If not breathing or very shallow, start CPR: 30 chest compressions at 100-120/min, then 2 rescue breaths 4. Continue CPR until ambulance arrives or person responds
7. 1. Reassure them and keep them calm and still 2. Apply steady pressure with a clean cloth to the wound 3. Do NOT remove any embedded objects—stabilize them 4. Monitor breathing and consciousness; call ambulance if not already done
8. Check scene safety—look for hazards like traffic, fire, and fuel spills.
9. 112—it's the universal emergency number for ambulance, fire, and police.
10. Placing an unconscious person on their side with head tilted back to keep the airway open.

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
