

What Are Parking Rules and Prohibitions?

Worksheet

Parking is prohibited within 5 m of intersections, on sidewalks, in bus/taxi stops, in disabled spaces without a permit, and in other marked no-parking zones. Always check signage.

Questions

1. Minimum distance from an intersection to park?
A) 2 meters
B) 5 meters
C) 8 meters
D) No limit
2. Disabled parking zone — who can use it?
A) Anyone with ID
B) Only vehicles with valid disabled permit
C) Temporary visitors
D) Anyone parking briefly
3. A car is parked on the sidewalk blocking a wheelchair path. What happens?
A) Warning only
B) Fine and possible towing
C) Charge to remove obstacles
D) Pedestrian can move it
4. Can you park in a 'No Parking' zone if you leave the engine running?
A) Yes, if quick
B) Yes, if hazards on
C) No, prohibited always

5. You want to park 3 m from an intersection corner. Is this allowed?
6. A car is parked on the sidewalk covering part of the pedestrian path. Legal?
7. Disabled-permit holder parks in a disabled zone. Allowed?
8. Define: How far from an intersection can you safely park?
9. Define: Can you park on a sidewalk?
10. Define: What zones strictly prohibit parking?

Answer Key

1. B) 5 meters — Safety rule: 5 m minimum (often marked). Parking closer blocks sight lines and traffic flow.
2. B) Only vehicles with valid disabled permit — Designated for disabled badge holders only. Fines are steep for violations.
3. B) Fine and possible towing — Sidewalk parking is illegal; vehicle can be towed at owner's expense.
4. C) No, prohibited always — Engine running or not, a 'No Parking' sign is absolute. Towing happens regardless.
5. Parking distance: 3 m Minimum safe distance: 5 m Result: NOT allowed — too close to intersection
6. Location: sidewalk (not roadway) Rule: vehicles must stay on roadway Result: NOT allowed — fined and likely towed
7. Zone: disabled parking Requirement: valid permit displayed If permit valid: allowed If no permit: subject to fine and towing
8. At least 5 meters (or per local signage). Parking closer risks a fine and towing.
9. No — vehicles must stay on the roadway to keep pedestrian paths clear.
10. Bus stops, taxi stands, disabled zones (without permit), fire hydrant zones, and loading zones.

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
