

What is Pedestrian Right-of-Way?

Worksheet

Pedestrian right-of-way grants walkers priority at crossings and on sidewalks, but exceptions apply: turning vehicles have priority during their turn, emergency vehicles always pass first, and certain traffic signals override pedestrian crossing.

Questions

1. At a marked crosswalk with a green pedestrian signal, who goes first?
A) Vehicle always
B) Pedestrian
C) Both at the same time
D) Whoever is faster
2. A vehicle is turning right. You want to cross. What should you do?
A) Cross quickly before the turn
B) Wait for the turn to finish
C) Honk to get attention
D) Cross diagonally
3. You cross at an unmarked area. A car hits you. Who is liable?
A) Vehicle driver
B) Pedestrian (you)
C) Police
D) Both equally
4. What does an emergency vehicle (siren on) mean for pedestrians?
A) Pedestrians have priority
B) Emergency vehicle must wait
C) Both cross together
D) Emergency vehicle must stop
5. You are at a marked crosswalk (zebra) with a green pedestrian signal. Can you cross?
6. A car is turning right at an intersection. You want to cross. What is the rule?
7. You are crossing at an unmarked spot. A car comes. Who has priority?
8. Define: What is pedestrian right-of-way?
9. Define: Do pedestrians have priority over turning vehicles?
10. Define: Can pedestrians cross at unmarked areas?

Answer Key

1. B) Pedestrian — Green pedestrian signal = pedestrian priority. Vehicles must stop.
2. B) Wait for the turn to finish — Turning vehicles have priority. Always wait for the turn to complete.
3. B) Pedestrian (you) — Crossing outside marked areas = pedestrian has no priority; pedestrian is liable.
4. A) Pedestrians have priority — Emergency vehicles always have priority. Pedestrians must immediately clear the road.
5. Marked crosswalk (Polis Meydanı Geçışı) with green signal = pedestrian priority. Yes, cross immediately. Vehicles must stop and give way. You have the right-of-way.
6. Turning vehicle has priority over pedestrian crossing. Do NOT cross while the car is turning. Wait for the vehicle to complete its turn. Only then cross the street.
7. Unmarked crossing = no pedestrian priority. Vehicle has priority in this situation. You must yield to the vehicle. Always cross at marked crosswalks (zebra) or traffic signals.
8. The legal priority given to pedestrians at crossings and sidewalks to cross safely.
9. No — turning vehicles have priority. Pedestrians must wait for the turn to complete.
10. No — crossing outside marked areas (zebra/signals) means vehicles have priority.

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
