

What are Speed Limit Regulations by Zone?

Worksheet

Speed limits vary by zone: urban areas (50 km/h), residential zones (30–40 km/h), highways (100–110 km/h) and motorways (130 km/h). Always obey the posted signs and adjust for weather and road conditions.

Questions

1. In a 50 km/h urban zone, is it legal to drive at 55 km/h?
A) Yes, it is safe
B) No, 50 km/h is the limit
C) Yes, if traffic is light
D) Only at night
2. Speed limits are highest on:
A) Residential streets
B) Motorways
C) School zones
D) Parking areas
3. Can you drive at the posted speed limit in bad weather?
A) Yes, always
B) No, slow down for safety
C) Only if visibility is good
D) Limits change in rain
4. Highway speed limit is typically:
A) 30 km/h
B) 50 km/h
C) 110 km/h
D) No limit
5. You are driving in a residential area (zone marked 30 km/h). You are on time for an appointment. Can you exceed 30 km/h?
6. You are on a highway with a posted limit of 110 km/h. Can you drive at 120 km/h if traffic is light?
7. Motorway speed limit is 130 km/h. During heavy rain, should you drive at the posted limit?
8. Define: What is the speed limit in residential zones?
9. Define: Urban area speed limit?
10. Define: Highway speed limit?

Answer Key

1. B) No, 50 km/h is the limit — 50 km/h is the legal limit — driving at 55 km/h is speeding and illegal.
2. B) Motorways — Motorways have the highest speed limits (typically 130 km/h or more) because they are designed for high-speed travel.
3. B) No, slow down for safety — Speed limits are maximums for ideal conditions. In bad weather, rain or snow, you must drive slower than the posted limit.
4. C) 110 km/h — Highways typically have speed limits of 100–110 km/h, depending on the country and road type.
5. The sign clearly shows 30 km/h — this is the legal limit. You must NOT exceed this limit, even if you are in a hurry. Speeding in residential zones is dangerous and illegal — fines apply.
6. The sign shows 110 km/h — this is the legal maximum. Driving at 120 km/h exceeds the limit — this is speeding. You must obey the posted limit regardless of traffic conditions.
7. Although the limit is 130 km/h, weather conditions matter. In heavy rain, you should slow down below the limit for safety. Speed limits are maximums — adjust for actual conditions.
8. 30–40 km/h — residential areas have low speed limits to protect pedestrians and safety.
9. 50 km/h is the standard speed limit in cities and built-up areas.
10. 100–110 km/h is typical on main roads and highways (exact limit varies by country/road).

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
